

Katherine Mazaroski, a Junior at Sacred Heart Academy in Nassau County, New York, is The American Legion New York State Oratorical Champion for 2025. This year's contest was conducted on March 8 at the Crown Plaza-Desmond Hotel, Albany.

As this year's champion, Katherine Mazaroski wins a \$6,000 scholarship. AMERICAN LEGION BOYS STATE AND NATION AMERICAN LEGION BOYS STATE

Since 1935, American Legion Boys State has been one of the country's most revered and selective government instruction programs, teaching high school students about the operation of local, county and state governments. Fifty American Legion departments conduct this program, serving more than 17,000 young men each year. The American Legion Auxiliary sponsors a similar program for young women called Girls State.

At American Legion Boys State, young men learn about the rights, privileges, duties and responsibilities of a franchised citizen. Elected and appointed local officials offer participants objective, practical training in city, county and state governance, and activities are conducted such as legislative sessions, court proceedings, law enforcement presentations, assemblies, band, chorus and recreational programs.

American Legion posts select participants to attend their respective Boys State program after receiving recommendations from school officials. Usually posts, local businesses or community organizations pay the cost of attendance.

American Legion Boys State participants go on to achieve success in a variety of fields. Notable alumni include astronaut Neil Armstrong, basketball legend Michael Jordan and national television news journalist Tom Brokaw.

The Doctors Corner

Diabetic Neuropathy is nerve damage that occurs from high blood sugar levels for an extended period of time. Even if you have it, you can and should do more (to prevent the worsening of your condition). High sugar levels for prolonged times also cause other complications. Sugar is in everything we eat. Look at the labels and you would be amazed how much of it we get (even if we don't want it).

With diabetics the damage is most often seen in the legs and feet (in its early stages). This is called Periph-

eral neuropathy. These patients tend to lose feeling in the extremities. Symptoms can range from numbness, and pain to problems with infections. This is why it is highly recommended for diabetics to look at their feet with a mirror to check for sores, ulcers and other abnormalities. Wearing shoes to protect your feet like in your back yard, in the park, or at beaches is extremely important. Small cuts, by anything can go unnoticed until a full blow infection occurs.

Other symptoms with high sugar levels can be seen with the digestive system (problems eating), urinary tract (frequency issues and infections), heart disease, kidney disease and a patient's loss of sexual arousal (to have a healthy productive intimate relationship with their partner). These symptoms fall under what is termed Autonomic neuropathies.

Proximal (or radiculoplexus) neuropathy can present with damage to nerves in the thighs, hip or buttocks. Mononeuropathy present when a specific nerve of the face, body or legs is damaged. This can appear like a stroke (if in the face). See your health care provider anytime you notice any small change from your norm. It is better to be sure than take a chance and not correct what you can early.

Factors that add to the progression dangers of Diabetic neuropathies are: smoking, alcohol, poor blood sugar control (the longer the duration, the worse the condition can become), kidney problems and being overweight. Basic prevention is key and here the most important thing you can do is keep your blood sugar as tightly controlled as possible. Work with a doctor, a diabetic educator, a dietician but get it right and don't give up. This will pay dividends in your health and wellbeing.

In closing, along with blood sugar control take care of your feet! They have carried you all this time show them some love. Check your feet for blisters, cuts, bruising and peeling. Keep them clean at all times and wear clean dry socks. And always wear well-fitting shoes with cushion soles. Coordinate with your doctors and take your medicine as prescribed. This may sound simple but it will help you if done right.

Always remember you matter! and your Post 833 family is here for you! Always wishing you safety and the best in health. God bless you and thank you for your service to our great country.





The 1st United States Volunteer Cavalry was one of three voluntary regiments raised during the Spanish American War. The regiment was commanded by Colonel Leonard Wood and was called "Wood's Weary Walkers", since despite being a cavalry unit, they fought on foot as infantry.

Theodore Roosevelt was Wood's second in command. When Colonel Wood became commander of the 2nd Cavalry Brigade, "Wood's Weary Walkers" became know as "Roosevelt's Rough Riders."

United States Volunteers-America claims its heritage from Teddy Roosevelt's Rough Riders, the last volunteer cavalry unit to serve in the United States military. The Rough Riders were officially called the "United States Volunteers" and wore USV as their collar insignia.

New York State Cold War Certificate

To whom awarded:

The Cold War Certificate may be awarded to any current New York State citizen or a person who was a New York State citizen while serving in the Armed Forces of the United States during the Cold War period, 2 September 1945 to 26 December 1991, whose entire service was honorable.

Standards:

This certificate may be awarded only to those persons whose discharge certificate indicates service under the conditions of "honorable" (Honorable Discharge) or "under honorable conditions" (General Discharge under Honorable Conditions).

This certificate may be awarded posthumously to a designated survivor of the deceased. Not more than one certificate shall be awarded to any one person. This is a one-time issue.

How awarded:

Applications for the New York State Cold War Certificate will be made using **DMNA Form 105**.

Posthumous applications will be submitted using the same mechanisms, using DMNA Form 105-1.

You will need to use Adobe Reader (or Adobe Acrobat) to view the applications above. Adobe Reader can be downloaded for free from https://get.adobe.com/reader/

Applications may be submitted By Mail to: Division of Military and Naval Affairs, ATTN: MNGA-AWD, 330 Old Niskayuna Road Latham, NY 12110

or electronically by Email to:ng.ny.nyarng.list.cold-war@army.mil

For security reasons, email attachments must be in 'PDF', 'JPG' or 'GIF' format. Attachments in any other format are blocked by the email system.

All requests will be sent to the New York Division of Military and Naval Affairs with supporting documents attached/enclosed to validate service during the Cold War period.

Documentation will include a copy of the recipient's Report of Separation (i.e., WD AGO Form 53-55, DD Form 214, or NGB Form 22, etc.). Documentation must include a discharge certificate indicating the character of service as "honorable" (Honorable Discharge) or "under honorable conditions" (General Discharge under Honorable Conditions). Ensure documentation submitted clearly indicates New York State residency while on duty in the Armed Forces during the applicable dates.

Do not send original proof of military service documents. Please ensure only the last 4 digits of the Social Security number are visible. It is also recommended the Date of Birth be crossed off.

If you do not have, in your possession, the required documentation necessary for eligibility or require confirmation of your federal service, you may request a copy of your service record by writing to:

National Personnel Records Center, Veterans Special Actions Division, 9700 Page Boulevard, St. Louis, MO 63132.

Privacy Notice

Authority: Military Law, section 247.

Principal Purpose: To secure sufficient information from an applicant or a requester to determine eligibility and to process requests for the Cold War Recognition Certificate.

Routine Uses: Information is used for official purposes within the Division of Military and Naval Affairs; specifically, to process requests for Cold War Certificates. This information may be used in accordance with established uses for the Division of Military and Naval Affairs.

Disclosure: Disclosure of the last four (4) digits of the Social Security Number and other personal information is voluntary. However, failure to provide complete information may hinder proper identification of the requester, and may prevent the agency from determining eligibility of the requester for the Cold War Certificate.

<u>Instructions</u>: Fill out this application and mail with <u>supporting documentation</u> to the Division of Military and Naval Affairs, ATTN: MNGA-AWD, with your proof of military service. Acceptable supporting documents include any official government or military document that contains the recipient's name, address indicating New York State residency, last four numerals of the recipient's Social Security Number, and dates of service showing at least one day of service during the Cold War era (September 2, 1945 to December 26, 1991). Examples of acceptable supporting documentation include DD Form 214, WD AGO 53-55, and NGB Form 22. **DO NOT SEND ORIGINAL DOCUMENTS.**



Starting April 1, 2024, New York veterans and Gold Star families will be granted free access to state parks, campgrounds, historic sites and recreational day areas throughout the state, thanks to an expansion of the Lifetime Liberty Pass Program, the governor's office announced.



This program will now give the following benefits:

- Free vehicle parking at New York State Parks and DEC-operated campgrounds, day use areas, boat launch sites, historic sites, arboretums, and park preserves
- No greens fees at State Park-operated golf courses
- No swimming pool entrance fees at State Park-operated pools
- Discounted campsite and cabin rentals at State Park and DEC-operated campgrounds

Gold Star Family Members will receive the program's benefits when they present a Lifetime Liberty Pass card to employees at staffed parks. Lifetime Liberty Pass applications will be available on the Office of Parks, Recreation and Historical Preservation's website starting on April 1. Veterans who have a veteran status designation on their New York State DMV ID can present their ID to employees and don't need to apply for a card.

The lifetime pass covers entrance fees for a driver and all passengers in a personal vehicle (or passholder and up to three adults at sites that charge per person) at national parks and national wildlife refuges, as well as standard amenity fees at national forests and grasslands, and at lands managed by the Bureau of Land Management, Bureau of Reclamation and U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

VA Expands Burial Benefits



he VA last year announced new burial allowance rates for veterans who have died in nonservice-related incidents since October.

VA announced several updates to burial benefits aimed at providing support to veterans and their families. These updates, according to VA, reflect the department's commitment to honoring U.S. veterans around the world.

TRANSPORTATION EXPENSES

In the past, VA covered costs for transporting remains to eligible national cemeteries. Now, this benefit has been extended to include transportation expenses to state and tribal veteran cemeteries.

"[For service-related deaths], VA will pay up to \$2,000 toward burial expenses for deaths on or after Sept. 11, 2001, or up to \$1,500 for deaths prior to Sept. 11, 2001," according to VA. "If the veteran is buried in a VA national cemetery, some or all of the cost of transporting the deceased may be reimbursed."

For nonservice-related deaths, VA will pay a \$948 burial allowance and \$948 for a plot if the veteran died on or after Oct. 1, 2023. If the veteran died between Jan. 5, 2023, and Oct. 1, 2023, VA would pay an \$893 burial allowance and \$893 for a plot. PLAN 'END-OF-LIFE BENEFITS' NOW

VA Under Secretary for Benefits Joshua Jacobs noted in a VA press release that in fiscal year 2022, VA delivered more than 84,000 burial benefits to families.

"Expanding burial benefits means we are able to ensure veterans are honored in their final resting place and assist their family, caregivers and survivors during the difficult time of their loved one's passing," Jacobs said.

VA's national cemeteries provide benefits for traditional casket or cremation burials. For eligible veterans and family members, VA national cemetery burial benefits include:

- Opening and closing of the gravesite
- · Inscribed headstones or markers
- · Burial flag
- Award of the Presidential Memorial Certificate
- Perpetual care of the gravesite

 For those being pleased in private

For those being placed in private cemeteries, benefits only include:

- Headstones, markers or medallions for the gravesite
- · Burial flag
- Presidential Memorial Certificate

VA also may provide burial allowances to assist with a family member's burial and funeral costs for those eligible.
